Ministering to the Ministers

A deeply disquieted man walked into the psychiatrist's office. The doctor looked at him and asked, "How can I help you today?" The man began to unpack his long list of difficulties revealing him to be a depressed, anxious man with suicidal thoughts. He said, "I am the most miserable and unhappy man in town." After further conversation and deliberation the doctor replied, "I have a wonderful idea; the circus is in

town along with the famous clown, Grimaldi. He has to be the funniest man in the world. Relax, forget about all your problems, and go see Grimaldi." The man had a troubled look on his countenance as he lifted his gaze to the psychiatrist and responded, "Sir, I am Grimaldi!"

We tend to think that people in the public eye are exactly what they appear to be on stage. That often proves untrue and the ministry is no exception. It seems a reasonable expectation that the ones whose role it is to bring a message of faith, hope, and encouragement would be the most optimistic, resilient, and encouraged people among us. Sadly, that's not real life. Like Grimaldi, many pastors pour their professional efforts into comforting others while never finding similar consolation themselves.

In a study co-sponsored by Lifeway and Focus on the Family, pastors reported mental illness rates similar to the general population. According to the study, "about a quarter of pastors (23 percent), say they've experienced some kind of mental illness, while 12 percent say they received a diagnosis for a mental health condition."

If you are engaged in vocational Christian ministry as a pastor, missionary, church planter, evangelist or any other full-time capacity, then you have experienced the need for encouragement. You have discovered it is often lonely at the top. You realize that it is easier to project an air of confidence and the public image that you have it all together, than it is to live up to that same lofty ideal and the high expectations you have set for yourself when there is no one but you and God examining your life. Many look to you for counsel and encouragement, but who do you have? You have needed, currently need, and certainly in the future will need, a Barnabas.

For every Paul there needs to be a Barnabas! If there ever was a Christian minister considered to be a self-sustaining giant of the faith, with an incredible connection with God, and in no way dependent on the encouragement, consolation, and blessing of others, it would be the apostle Paul. He gave us half of the New Testament, was possessed of a zeal for church planting

and missionary endeavour second to none, and held the prestige and authority of an apostle. If there ever was a Christian we believe could make it on his own, it would've been Paul. We think of Paul as the greatest missionary statesman of the New Testament. Yet, Paul needed Barnabas, and we need him too. If Paul understood that supportive people like Barnabas were an integral part of his success, who are we to think we are resilient enough to make it on our own?

Often the greatest encouragement is gained in the knowledge that

there are others invested in the same goals. Knowing that someone is on your team brings incredible comfort. In I Corinthians 3:6, Paul said, "I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase." There is incredible spirit building power in teamwork. The leader, planter, or visionary leader needs others to come along, like Apollos, and invest in the missionary vision through contribution of their unique skills, abilities, and spiritual gifting.

William Carey arrived in Calcutta, India in the late 18th century. He immediately began to assess what was needed in his missionary endeavor. He quickly realized the need for partnership in the work. He wrote the Missionary Society in London suggesting at least seven or eight additional families be sent for the work. God did not intend for us to labor for Him alone. At times there may be no other option, but it is not ideal, as the invited to protect the results... The more obstacles you have, the more opportunities there are for God to do something."

God continues to bless the day center. He sends us 25-30 guests or more each day. We serve an average of 780 meals a month. We have an average of 182 showers and 35 loads of laundry a month. Think about this!

Twenty-five to thirty people each day come and go. We may serve 20 at breakfast and 20 at lunch but all are hearing the Gospel every day we are open. Some are hearing it twice a day!! God is so good!

We are still in desperate need of volunteers. As you can imagine, it takes a lot of hands to prepare 60 meals a day, keep the bathrooms, the gymnasium where we gather and worship Christ, and our dining area clean. Mostly, we need people to help us be a witness

for Christ. Sometimes people just need an ear or a friend. We strive to take the time to always pray and talk when someone asks. There are so many more resources we want to offer but we just don't have the manpower. Please help us pray that the Lord will send the right volunteers to us.
